Growing a new generation of female leaders at the University of Pretoria

The Leadership Academy currently focuses on training, mentoring and supporting first and second year female students from the University of Pretoria (Tuks). We invite the young ladies from 18 of our residences and day houses to become part of the Academy. We believe that every woman can be a leader and therefore everyone is welcome to participate. We have neither entrance requirements nor entrance fees. This approach has proven to be successful: the Academy started with 300 participants and has grown to 750 participants within one year.

The objectives of the Academy are to:

- lay a solid leadership foundation to promote good decision making by providing leadership training that is relevant to young women and the context they live in
- provide opportunities for young women to practice their leadership skills and train others
- equip and mobilise women to initiate their own community outreach programmes
- create a community of compassionate, responsible and ethical young female leaders who bring positive change to their environment

At the end of each year the participants are given formal recognition for completing the programme. They are encouraged to continue their leadership journey through transferring their new knowledge to their peers. Through sharing our learning we hope to create a ripple effect of empowered young women entering all spheres of society as they graduate.

The TuksRes Women in Leadership Academy has provided me with an opportunity of self-evaluation and self-discovery. Through the Academy I have identified and improved upon my personal leadership skills and capabilities, as well as gained insight on what it means to be a great leader, especially when it comes to female leadership. I am truly grateful to the Academy and hope it continues to support young women in their career and personal life goals.

Leading by example

Our Academy was started by students and is run by students. The Academy is currently jointly managed by 31 student leaders from diverse backgrounds, representing the diversity of our nation.

Preparing to lead: empowering young women for a leadership role

We develop leadership skills by offering information sessions, workshops and lectures by guest speakers. Guest speakers share their knowledge and wisdom and provide an opportunity to discuss issues that face women in our society. The content is developed with the student's context in mind and is designed to be practical and relevant.

Leading together: growing networks of leaders

We create an environment where growth is facilitated through mentorship and networking. Each residence/day house has a facilitator. These facilitators are senior students who have been trained in mentorship and leadership development. In this environment the students can build mutually beneficial relationships and networks.

Leadership in action: practicing responsible leadership

Our philosophy is that leadership is service and service is leadership. We therefore emphasise the importance of the context and community we live in. The participants are required to participate in a community outreach project. The students get the opportunity to teach the skills they have acquired to school girls.

For this purpose we have partnered with two high schools in Pretoria, the Tshwane Secondary School and the Pretoria Technical High School. We invite senior girls (Grade 10 to 12) to attend information sessions on relevant issues such as tertiary education and funding, basic health, first aid and hygiene. In 2016, approximately 140 girls attended these sessions.

The two-hour information sessions are held in the afternoon at the schools. The learners are divided into groups of six to ten girls. Volunteers from the Academy present the sessions. In the lively sessions information is presented, questions are asked, topics are debated and myths are challenged.

The volunteers receive the course contents, but it is up to them to decide how to present the information. Some prepare slide shows, others bring pictures and pamphlets and others give a hands-on demonstration. But all ensure that they incorporate a fun element and that activities are engaging.

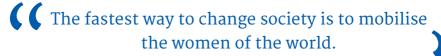
